I. Call to Order

Acting Chair Hoang called the meeting to order at 1:44 p.m. at which time quorum was established.

II. Review and Approval of the February 20, 2019 Meeting Minutes

Member Keane made a motion to approve the February 20, 2019 meeting minutes, which was seconded by Member Designee Tong. A vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously.

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III. Public Testimony on Agenda Items

None.

IV. Geographic Information System Data and Title Records

At the last IPSC meeting, members discussed the potential problem of having personal information available on public record documents and if the IPSC should consider having a risk assessment policy. Member Ung stated that the Counties of Maui and Hawaii have chosen EnerGov for their building permits system. She noted that Member Sherman had concerns about this issue and how they currently don't have a solution to deal with it. Ung mentioned that the information that are readily available on these records are not considered personal information. She and Sherman will create a local-level policy regarding how their GIS analyst should manage departmental data. William Monahan, DHS, will send Hoang a copy of the DHS' risk assessment. Members asked if a risk assessment template or guidelines are available that agencies can follow. Hoang stated that ETS will take the lead and work with agencies who have a risk assessment template.

V. Privacy Impact Assessment

Hoang would like the IPSC to review the Privacy Impact Assessment (PIA) form that government agencies complete and submit to the IPSC each year. He suggested forming a Permitted Interaction Group (PIG) to examine the current form then make recommendations for revisions at the IPSC June meeting. Member Thornton stated departments were asked to develop plans years ago to which Member Keane mentioned was around 2008. Departments developed plans but there was no follow up. Hoang added that the PIG could also examine the type of records that have PII and follow up with Departments as to what their plans are for mitigation. The goal is to reduce and protect PII. Members were asked to look for their department's plans and send a copy to Hoang. Susan Bannister will email the plans to the committee via blind copy.

Hoang asked for a motion to form a PIG to review the PIA form to better address identification, plan on how to reduce or protect personal information and revise the PIA form in time for the next PIA assessment and report. Member Lim so moved, which was seconded by Member Thornton. A vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously. Members of the PIG are Hoang, Keane, and Thornton.

VI. Good of the Order

a. Announcements

Hoang made a few announcements on behalf of ETS. Windows 7's end of life is January 2020, which Microsoft will no longer support. ETS is working with agencies who are using Windows 7 on an appropriate plan to migrate off of it.

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CIS controls version 7.1 was published last week. ETS will work on integrating it with the Executive Branch. Lastly, ETS is just about done enabling multifactor authentication (MFA) for email.

CONVENING A TASK FORCE TO EXAMINE AND RECOMMEND LAWS AND REGULATIONS TO UPDATE PRIVACY LAW.

WHEREAS, one particular area in which internet use has expanded and governments have struggled to comprehensively regulate is the collection, transmission, processing, protection, and storing of personal data and information; and

WHEREAS, because of this struggle, the privacy of individuals across the world has been compromised; and

WHEREAS, some jurisdictions have attempted to regulate the collection, transmission, processing, protection, and storing of personal data and information in an effort to protect privacy of internet users; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, the General Data Protection Regulation went into effect across the European Union, and placed significant restrictions on companies that collect, transmit, process, protect, and store personal data collected over the internet; and

WHEREAS, additionally, the General Data Protection Regulation established significant penalties for those that do not comply with the Regulation; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, the California Consumer Privacy Act was signed into law and will go into effect in 2020; and

WHEREAS, similar to the General Data Protection Regulation, the California Consumer Privacy Act gives consumers rights, such as the right to opt out of the sale of any personal information; have personal data erased; and require companies to disclose certain uses of personal data; and

WHEREAS, the State should examine existing internet privacy laws and regulations to determine how to best protect the privacy interests of the people of Hawaii; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirtieth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2019, the Senate concurring, that a twenty-first century privacy law task force be convened to examine and recommend laws and regulations relating to internet privacy; the collection, transmission, processing, protection, storage, and sale of personal data; hacking; data breaches; and other similar subjects; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any twenty-first century privacy law task force recommendations relating to internet

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privacy laws are requested to match or exceed the intent of Hawaii's existing privacy protections established in the State Constitution and Hawaii Revised Statutes; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the twenty-first century privacy law task force comprise the following members or their designees:

- One member of the Senate designated by the President of the Senate, who shall serve as co-chair of the Task Force;
- (2) Chair of the House Committee on Judiciary, who shall serve as co-chair of the Task Force;
- (3) Attorney General;
- (4) Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs;
- (5) Chief Information Officer; and
- (6) Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu: and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the co-chairs of the twentyfirst century privacy law task force may invite other interested parties to join the Task Force; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that members of the twenty-first century privacy law task force serve without compensation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the twenty-first century privacy law task force is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2019; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; Attorney General; Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs; Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; Chief Information

Officer; and Prosecuting Attorney for the City and County of Honolulu.

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
